

Final Paper Format

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Introduction

This document demonstrates the desired format of the final paper for CS / SySc 346U. The paper should have a header, like the one above, that contains the title, your name, the class name, and the term. The section titles should be boldface, and larger than the text (e.g., 14 point font). The text should be 11 or 12 point font, and should be double-spaced. The pages should be numbered. The paper should begin with an introductory section that describes the topic of your simulation and any hypotheses or questions that you explored by building and experimenting with your simulation. The total paper should be about 10-20 pages, including figures and references. **START EARLY!!!!**

Previous Related Work

In this section you should summarize the relevant parts of the published materials you read that are related to the topic of your simulation.

Details of Your Simulation

In this section, give details of your simulation—how it works, what questions it can address, what the different parts of the interface are.

Results of Your Simulation

In this section, give all the results from your simulation. Explain what experiments you did and what questions they were designed to answer, and what answers you got. Include any plots or other diagrams from your simulation that illustrate or support your results.

Discussion

In this section you should summarize and discuss your results. Were they what you expected? What did you learn from doing this simulation? How do your results relate to the previous related work you described in an earlier section?

Conclusions and Future Work

This section should contain any more general conclusions you drew from the results of your simulation, and ideas for future work you (or someone else) could do to follow up on or extend the work described in this paper.

References

Give a list of references you used, including the two papers you read and discussed in the Related Work section. See the Bibliography section of *Complexity: A Guided Tour* for examples of how references should be formatted. Make sure your references include the authors names, name of paper or book, name of journal or conference (if paper is from one of these), volume number and page numbers (if applicable), publisher (for books), and year of publication.
